#### Rationale

Bryn St Peter's is a Church of England Primary School. As such, it takes its responsibility to educate children in the beliefs and practices of the Christian faith very seriously. A Christian ethos is actively fostered in the school in relation to all aspects of school life; worship is seen as central to this process. The 1988 Education Reform Act, modified by the Education Act (1993), requires all pupils in attendance at a maintained school "to take part in a daily act of collective worship" ERA Sections 6(1).

# Aims of Collective Worship at Bryn St Peter's

- To provide an opportunity for children to learn to pray and worship God
- To help children to develop compassion, interior posture, wisdom and
- courage and endurance through Christ's example
- To provide our pupils and staff with regular opportunities for stillness,
- reflection and prayer.
- To teach children how story, music, song, prayer, reflection, symbols, ritual
- and liturgical language assist us in worship
- To celebrate all aspects of school life and Christian community including the
- sharing of the gifts and talents of all our pupils.
- To promote the spiritual development of our children
- To develop a sense of community
- To introduce children to the language and rituals of the Church of England
- To introduce children to the important festivals, holy days and celebrations of
- the major World religions; Christian, Buddhist, Islamic, Sikh, Hindu and Jewish
- and faiths
- To celebrate and learn about cultural and religious diversity
- To provide an opportunity for collective celebration of success and key
- events in the life of the school
- To develop children's social and emotional literacy

# Collective Worship routines

A calendar of collective worship themes is organised by the collective worship lead, for each school year.

The themes are drawn from:

- Values for Life resource
- The Church's year
- Festivals of other important worshipping communities; major World
- Other religious festivals
- Picture News resource

# Collective worship is carefully planned and includes

- Use of traditional Church of England opening
- A focus Bible verse, story or inspirational image quote
- Music for entering, exciting or setting the tone
- A hymn or spiritual song.
- A story / drama / activity
- Time for reflection on the message of the collective worship
- The lighting of a candle and the use of words to explain the presence of the
- Holy Spirit during collective worship,
- The Lord's Prayer and the Grace are taught to children
- Pupil contribution through prayer

### Whole School Worship

- Some worships are planned to celebrate the major Christian festivals: Harvest, Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension, Pentecost as well as national days e.g. Remembrance and Holocaust Day. Care is taken to create a sense of occasion for our Worship.
- Prior to Covid-19, some worships are extended to all children and adults in school including visitors).
- Prior to Covid-19 we welcomed governors and parents and carers attendance at collective worship at any time.

This is under constant review in accordance with Public Health England guidelines.

# R.A.V.E Group

School has a R.A.V.E group comprising of children from years 2 to 6.

Their purpose is to review how collective worship and to talk to their peers about ways in which worship can be improved. The R.A.V.E group are responsible for the delivery different aspects of collective worship, both in the classroom and during joint worship. The R.A.V.E group also highlight children who have used Christian Values, these are then celebrated in Celebration Assembly.

#### Right of withdrawal

We expect all children to attend collective worship. However, any parent can request permission for their child to be excused from attending religious worship and the school will make alternative arrangements for the supervision of the child during the period concerned. Parents do not have to explain or give reasons for this. This complies with the 1944 Education Act and was restated in the 1988 Education Reform Act.

The Head Teacher keeps a record of all children who withdraw from collective worship.
